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FACTORS CONTRIBUTING TO THE POOR STUDENTS' PERFOMANCE AND COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT IN TANZANIA

Shortage of teachers and school libraries in most schools has been one of the factors that has contributed immensely to poor students' performance in Tanzania. This was revealed in the resolutions made at the 2011 Annual Workshop and Annual General Meeting of the Tanzania Library and Information Association (TLA)

in Mbeya region in February, 2011.

The Mbeya Regional Administrative Secretary Mr. Moses Chitama, who presided at the workshop on behalf of the MbeyaRegionalCommissioner, John Mwakipesile noted in his inaugural speech that, unless the government and the people of Tanzania collaborate to construct and equip the school libraries, the problem of poor performance by our students will persist for a long time to come.

Mr. Chitama urged the district councils in the country to plan and work closely with TLA and Tanzania Library Service Board to ensure that school libraries in the country are well equipped and utilised by the student community to further their knowledge on productivity, entrepreneurship and professional development. He said the spill over effect of knowledge development by student community must reach the communities around and in so doing the relevance of having school libraries will be felt in the country.

Responding to the inaugural speech by Mr Chitama, the TLA chairman, Mr Abdallah Hassan commended the Government's efforts of

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increasing secondary schools in the country; but urged the government to ensure that all schools have libraries which are sufficiently stocked and manned by trained personnel.

The workshop brought together over 90 librarians and information professionals from both Tanzania Mainland and Zanzibar.

In another development,

the TLA with support from EABDA/BAMVITA organised a Hands-on Training Course on Information Literacy to practicing Librarians as a preconference to the annual event. The workshop took place from February 21st to February 23rd, 2011 at Mkapa Hall in Mbeya.

In recognition of the importance of information literacy to librarians and information workers in the country TLA organised the training to enable librarians to keep

pace with the fast changing professional environment including development in technology.

Participants who mainly came from South and Southern Highlands appreciated the workshop and indicated that the knowledge gained from the course coincided with what they expected, and that they feel now more comfortable in

the field than before.

STREET LIBRARY FOR ALL SEASONS

ack of adequate reading materials and Library services for the neighborhood children moved Mr. Paul Luvinga to start a street Library at his residence in "Sinza E" area in Dar es Salaam in 1998. The project has now earned him the Safari Lager best contributor to community social development award, which was broadcast live by ITV Radio.

Mr. Luvinga narrates nostalgically, that the road to winning this award was both arduous and straining. He recalls how he indulged into this project in 1998, at a time when his hands had hardly laid on cash, neither was he expecting to secure any external support to his project, yet, his obsession and conviction of providing the children in the neighbor hood with a modest library was

so strong that it was literary overriding all other factors.

He says, there is nothing more touching than to see small children who are so dedicated to reading that they would literary beat up the cold weather of the night and the deadly mosquitoes to book for a convenient corner outside Luvinga's house, where they would spend long hours either reading or finishing school assignments, with the help of the security lights around his house

He notes that, it was this background that he was so touched by these unfortunate children's spirit and their insatiable dedication searching for knowledge that he vowed to help them nurture their dreams by providing them with modest reading room, which will be equipped with some convenient reading facilities.

Luvinga says to begin with he stashed away some 750,000 shillings from the family budget to overhaul his small shop and reconvert it to a small library. He says that, although the room was small and ill equipped with a few reading materials, it was comparatively far much better and far more convenient than the outside verandah where the vagaries of weather greatly hampered the childrens' efforts.

He says gradually the number of users have increased tremendously resulting into a further expansion of the room and services. When he made an interview with this reporter, the soft spoken Luvinga said, recently he had to inject into the project an additional TSh. 3.5 million to cater for increased reading space and book shelves and additional reading materials in form of Continue on page 5

The School's Chief Executive told this reporter that further to reviewing the school curriculum, the workshop also examined and analyzed courses currently taught in order to evaluate their validity

and relevance of present day Library and information manager.

The workshop tried also to identify qualities and competencies that the present Library and Information service Manager/Officer is expected to have and relate them to the curriculum as well as to come up with a draft copy that will eventually be molded into a new curriculum expected to last several years before the next curriculum review.

COTUL FEES GOES UP NEXT YEAR

onsortium of Tanzania University and Research Libraries (COTUL) Annual General Meeting(AGM), which was held at Doplhin Hotel in Tanga from 29th -30th September 2010 has endorsed a suggestion by the COTUL Secretariat to raise the annual membership fees from the current 300,000 Tshs to 500,000 Tshs effective next year.

The meeting was informed that as a result of the soaring operational costs by the COTUL secretariat in Dar, as well as the rise in inflation, which is said to have gone up four folds since the last time the fee was restructured, has really bogged down COTUL operations in Tanzania. The Incumbent COTUL Chairman, Professor Jangawe Msuya asked the meeting to endorse the changes in its fee structure so as to resuscitate the organization.

Further to endorsing the new fee structure, the meeting also observed that the use of eresources by majority of the universities in the East African Region was still low possibly because of lack of awareness registration and searching skills. Speaking at the launch of the meeting Dr Alli Mcharazo said, many Universities are still shy to use electronic resources, noting that as a result they groping with have been skyrocketing prices of printed materials and more often they have found themselves unable to buy these printed materials and therefore failed to satisfy the user information needs.

He noted that it is not a secret that our library's are illequipped with reading materials because library budgets have constantly been declining in nearly all universities. He said the right solution to combating information needs in the universities is to turn to electronic resources.

Dr Alli Mcharazo called upon every member to form an

e resource team and to co ordinate e-resource related activities. He also called upon members to subscribe to ejournals for the year 2011.

AGM culminated with the launch of COTUL website by Dr. Alli Mcharazo, the Director General of Tanzania Library Services Board. The URL for is www.cotul.org

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journals, magazines, and newspapers.

He boasts that all services at his library are free of charge to those who are willingly offer to contribute a token amount for electricity bills. He further says that the Library is jointly managed by users themselves where everybody is responsible to make sure that nobody steals the books newspapers. Lending services exist whereby users borrow books and return them as scheduled. The users of the Library include Primary, Secondary, College students and adults who are interested in reading and developing their skills.

He says through this integrative system of library administration and management the readership find this library as "their own" and therefore have refrained from stealing library property, and furthermore they have voluntarily brought in reading materials from their respective home for sharing with others.

"No one will in this case steal from the Library that he owns himself". He says boastfully as an answer to the question how does he manage to come to terms with the problem of library vandalism and thieving.

With a minimal training in Librarianship, Luvinga has created a self structured system of lending services. He says the system enable him to constantly monitor his stock and has literary controlled the problem of overdue returns. He says currently his main challenges include lack of enough books especially for primary school pupils, and reading space. Despite the challenges, Mr. Luvinga's plans for the future is to establish more libraries (at least four) in Sinza area and if possible move to other Regions e.g. Coast, Iringa and Mbeya. He plans to use part of the TSh. 10 million he won to start establishment of Libraries in the Regions he has mentioned.

Teachers Librarians in the schools which received book donations will be responsible for day to day running of the Library. Depending on availability of funds there will also be a follow up to those school libraries to ensure continuity of the service. Challenges facing this project include lack of adequate funds for purchasing books to cater for more schools.

The donors have however commended Biharamulo District officials for their cooperation in the project and promise further collaboration.


Library Studies, having started with elementary certificate.

The Institute Rural Development Planning (IRDP) Library is located at Miyuji area about 7km from Dodoma Municipal Centre along Arusha Road. The IRDP Library was established in 1979 with the main objective providing information materials that meets the teaching, research and consultancy needs.

2007 Since year **IRDP** library has succeeded various ways which include staff development, infrastructure, library collection, library services and library membership in various organizations such as Tanzania Library and Information Association (TLA) and the Consortium of Tanzania University and Research Libraries (COTUL).

IRDP Library right now has 14 members of staff with qualifications ranging from certificates to Masters level as compared to the period prior to 2007 when there were only six members of staff with one Diploma holder.

AMERICAN PROFESSOR DELIVERS LECTURES TO LIBRARIANS

distinguished American A Professor of Library and Information Science at the University of California, Los Angeles Dr. John V. Richards Jr recently visited Tanzania to deliver a series of professional lectures to Librarians and Students of School Library Archives and Documentation Studies (SLADS) Bagamoyo. Dr. Richardson Jr was in the country from Friday, August 27 to Friday, September 17 when he departed back to the US from Kilimanjaro International Airport.

During his visit, which was sponsored by the American Embassy (Dar es Salaam) Dr. Richardson had opportunity to meet Librarians of various institutions with whom he exchanged notes. He visited the University of Dar es Salaam Library; National Central Library, Tanzania Library

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before year 2007 it had capacity of serving only 70 users. IRDP is also connected to the Internet, CCTV and a fire detector system. It is also automated using Adlib software.

Currently IRDP Library book collection stands at 14,924 whereas in 2007 it was 11,326. The library also subscribes to e-resources on 45 databases through PERI/INASP. The future plans for the Library are on collection development and further improvement in information service to users.
